

Pupil premium example statement (primary)

The pupil premium statement below is an example, created for a fictitious primary school. Its purpose is to help you populate the DfE pupil premium template. All schools are required to use the DfE template to complete and publish their pupil premium statement on their school website by 31 December.

Before completing the template, you should read the DfE's [Using Pupil Premium](#) guidance and the EEF guide to [using your pupil premium effectively](#).

School leaders are best placed to assess their pupils' needs and identify how to use the funding to help disadvantaged pupils to improve their attainment. This example statement is not intended to demonstrate any expectations regarding:

- The length of your statement or the volume and type of activity that you use your pupil premium (and recovery premium) to fund.
- The external providers you use, which is why there are references to 'purchase of a programme' rather than the name of a provider (you should state the name of any external providers in your statement).
- The targets you should set, which is why 'X' and 'X – Y' (for a range) have been used in place of specific figures for the purposes of this example.

Referring to evidence

As per the pupil premium conditions of grant, you must draw on evidence of effective practice in your decision-making and reference this within your school's statement. You do not need to cite every piece of evidence you have referred to.

The evidence cited in this example is primarily from the Education Endowment Foundation (EEF), as the What Works Centre for educational achievement, but it is up to you to decide what forms of evidence you use to support your decision-making – you should satisfy yourself that it is strong evidence and applicable to your school and pupils.

Part A: Pupil premium strategy plan

Statement of intent

Semley CE VA Primary School is a small rural primary that sits on the edge of the Dorset/Wiltshire border. There are currently 123 children on role. We have % on the SEND register and currently 1% of children with an EHCP. 6.5% of our pupils are eligible for Pupil Premium.

Semley CE VA Primary has high expectations for all its pupils irrespective of their background or challenges they might face. The assumption is that all pupils will make the progress they are capable of in all subjects, acknowledging all will start at different points and have differing opportunities at home. All are respected, valued and able to develop to their full potential. We also recognize as a staff and governorship that some pupils who are not eligible for Pupil Premium

The tool that we primarily use for all children is Quality First Teaching to support all children achieving the best outcomes. This is supported by EEF (Education Endowment Foundation) and is proven to support the closing of the gap between those who are disadvantaged and advantaged. High expectation are set for both pupils and staff. Best practice is shared and also professional development is important to all.

Careful consideration is made around the social, emotional, and mental health of individuals to ensure that this is not a barrier to their learning. Within our provision we can provide ELSA support from a trained member of staff. The school endeavors to identify barriers to learning pupils may have, a range of assessment tools are used and this ensures that intervention is appropriate and timely. Teaching assistants may well be deployed to support pupils. Data is tracked across the school, and compared with both national and County data to ensure all pupils are making progress.

Alongside academic and social, emotional and mental support careful tacking of attendance and behaviour is used within the school in order to look for trends which might be affecting the attainment of pupils. Semley CE VA Primary attends regular EWO (Educational Welfare Officer) meetings to support pupils.

Challenges

This details the key challenges to achievement that we have identified among our disadvantaged pupils.

1	Poor attendance can affect progress. Consistent attendance can support all pupils to ensure they make the progress of which they are carefully.
2	Historic inconsistent phonics teaching leading to falling Phonics Screening Data
3	Social and emotional mental health of children impacting their ability to achieve.
4	Continued impact of covid on Speech and Language acquisition and the impact that this has on reading and writing across curriculums
5	Ensure that staff are confident in delivering a varied and rich curriculum which allows all to achieve.
6	Extra curricula activities are accessible to all and support the development of pupils.
